ANNUAL REPORT OF THE BOARD OF SELECTMEN

The Board of Selectmen re-organized for the 1997-1998 session on June 4, 1997 following the Annual Town Election and ballot recount. Selectman John M. Bailey was elected Chairman, Nathaniel T. Dexter, Clerk, and Alexandra W. Turner, Third Member.

From the first day of January, the Board dedicated itself to ensuring that the Town budget for the ensuing fiscal year addressed at least the basic operational needs of each Town department and also provide our schools with an adequate share of the total budget. The Board worked closely and diligently with the five members of the Finance Committee and provided valuable insight with which they used to achieve a balanced budget.

Routine matters also kept the Board rather busy during the year. The Selectmen reviewed and approved applications for Earth Products Removal Permits, 1st, 2nd, and 3rd Class Motor Vehicle Dealers Licenses, Common Victuallers licenses, gasoline and other fuel storage licenses, and many other special activity permits. In addition, the Board conducted several hearings on applications from Massachusetts Electric and New England Telephone for joint pole locations throughout the Town.

The Selectmen's year began with the onset of contract negotiations with the Massachusetts Coalition of Police Local #203, the Police Officers Union, the Massachusetts Coalition of Police Local #203A, the Public Safety Dispatchers Union, and the American Federation of State, County, and Municipal Employees, Council 93, Lancaster Public Works Employees Union. Many collective bargaining meetings with the three Unions were held and at the close of the calendar year, the two public safety unions executed three year agreements with the Town effective through June 30, 2000. The DPW Union signed their first contract for a two year period ending June 30, 1999.

The year 1997 also saw the Board delve deeply into sewer planning initiatives. In January, the Selectmen hosted a forum to discuss regional and local sewer initiatives. The participants, representing the Devens Commerce Center, the Lancaster Sewer District Commission, and the North Central Massachusetts Chamber of Commerce, discussed a sewer district boundary expansion and sewer line extension from South Lancaster to the Town Center to serve the wastewater disposal needs of municipal buildings and private property owners. In addition, the participants reviewed several options to bring public sewer to North Lancaster from the Devens area and from the City of Leominster to serve commercial; industrial, and residential needs.

Following a very active 1996, the Lancaster School Building Needs Committee completed their study and review of proposals submitted by architectural firms to conduct a comprehensive school needs assessment and facilities study. The Committee recommended that the Selectmen contract with the firm of Alderman & MacNeish, Architects & Engineers, of West Springfield. Alderman & MacNeish, the firm which designed the current Middle School, completed their study on schedule and the Board of Selectmen, on the recommendation of the newly appointed School Building Committee, contracted with Mullin Associates of Pelham, to conduct a "build-out" assessment and enrollment forecasting analysis for the Committee. This phase of the School Building needs review continued into 1998.

Following its establishment in 1996, the Public Safety Building Expansion Committee reviewed proposals from several architects who sought the opportunity to conduct a feasibility study of the Lancaster Public Safety facilities. The Committee recommended that Reinhardt Associates of Agawam being hired. The Selectmen agreed and signed a contract for the study to commence in 1997 and be completed the following year.

In May, the Board formally organized the Community Development and Planning Office with the appointment of Gabrielle (Holmes) Riley as the first Office Manager. The Office manager will centralize all records, maintain public accessibility, and provide administrative support to the Conservation

Commission, Planning Board, Zoning Board of Appeals, Industrial Economic Development Commission, Building Commissioner, Electrical Inspector, Sealer of Weights and Measures, Gas & Plumbing Inspector, and the Town Forest Committee.

Throughout the year, the Selectmen maintained regular communication with officials of the Massachusetts Correctional Institutions at Lancaster and Shirley.

The Selectmen and Finance Committee continued to meet monthly with the Boards of Selectmen and Finance Committees from Bolton and Stow in "round table" discussions focusing on mutual interests, specifically the Nashoba Regional School District budget.

In May, the Architectural Firm of William H. Rowe and Associates was hired to design a handicap accessible restroom from two existing restrooms on the first floor of Town Hall. The project went out to bid in August and was awarded in October to Omjoza Construction Co. of Burlington for the bid price of \$18,900. At the close of 1997, the project was 90% complete.

In June, the Board appointed seven citizens and the Police Chief to serve on the newly created Traffic Study Commission. The Selectmen charged the Commission with investigating the traffic safety needs of the Town and to report back their findings and recommendations to the Board for action.

In August, the voters overwhelmingly approved an override to fund the operating budget for the fiscal year 1998. The following day, the voters at the Special Town Meeting balanced the budget.

Also in August, the Board met with the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers to discuss plans to address the continuing bank erosion along the North Nashua River on Luneaburg Road. The Board agreed to work with the Corps and the Massachusetts Department of Environmental Management to address the erosion problem. The Corps agreed to proceed with engineering and design work to extend the existing rip-rap protection upstream and downstream for project bidding in 1998.

The Board wishes to acknowledge the frequent presence and assistance of Representative Patricia A. Walrath and Senator Robert A. Antonioni, who kept the Board and Town advised of numerous state-related issues involving the Town of Lancaster. They also deserve our thanks and appreciation for guiding many bills of local concern through the legislative process.

And finally, a sincere thanks and appreciation for the dedication and commitment of the Selectmen's Office staff. Kathy Lamb, Administrative Secretary to the Board, has provided efficient daily support to the Board for sixteen years. Kathy works tirelessly to see that citizen questions are responded to, letters and correspondence, meeting minutes and agenda are prepared, licenses are processed and issued, vouchers are prepared and bills are paid, accounts are maintained, and the flow of other daily business is addressed. Also, to Town Administrator Alan Agnelli, our appreciation for his work in administering the policies of the Board and his accomplishments during the year. His professionalism, assistance, and guidance to this Board and all Town departments and boards is greatly acknowledged and respected.

In conclusion, we extend our thanks to the many citizens who contributed their time and talent to serve on Town boards and committees. We continue to encourage citizens to participate in their town government by attending public meetings, volunteering to serve, and by offering input at Town meetings. Also, a sincere thanks to the men and women who serve the Town every day as employees. All are dedicated professionals who deserve our respect and admiration. Thank you for the opportunity to serve you.

LANCASTER AMBULANCE

Nineteen hundred ninety-seven was a busy year for the Ambulance Department, which is twelve members strong. We responded to three hundred seventy-nine calls for medical aid and collected \$53,203 in revenue.

Continuing education is an important aspect of being an Emergency Medical Technician (EMT). EMT's attend monthly drills in addition to participating in mock disasters; the most recent one was sponsored by Clinton Hospital. This entailed a simulated fire and explosion at a local nursing home. EMT's from surrounding towns were critiqued on their skills regarding response, patient care and treatment, and transport to local hospital.

Many members donated their time and service to participate in Community Outreach programs. These included participating at the JCC camp, Emergency Medical Service week sponsored by the Lancaster Memorial and Browning Elementary Schools, and the fireworks display held at the Doctor Franklin Perkins School.

We would like to thank all the people who made contributions to the Ambulance Fund. In addition we wish to thank the Police, Fire, Rescue, and Communication Center for their support.

I am pleased to submit my first report as Animal Inspector for the calendar year 1997.

The position of Animal Inspector is established by state law for the purpose of preventing the spread of disease from animals to humans. The animals are routinely inspected for signs of infectious diseases, and the associated barns, stalls, and paddocks, etc. are inspected for proper sanitation. The Animal Inspector also deals with the quarantine of animals in cases of animal bites on order to determine whether the animal is rabid.

RE: Board of Assessors policy for valuation of property in the Town of Lancaster.

In order to insure the integrity of the valuation system now in place in the Town of Lancaster the Board of Assessors at there regular meeting of February 2, 1998 has adopted the following as a policy. Only those areas of valuation the Board determines to be of a specialized nature will be contracted to consultant firms. At the present time those areas are Commercial/Industrial and Personal Property valuations. The Board of Assessors will maintain as its work the remainder of valuation system. The Board will continue to be responsible for the collection of all data including data collected by contract. The Board will be directly responsible for the collection of data on a day to day basis as it relates to Building Permits and will measure and list all new properties as well as addition to existing properties. The Lancaster Board of Assessors will accomplish all encyclical inspections and will develop a program to insure that this is accomplished. The program will divide the Town into areas or blocks of property to be inspected on a schedule that will be sufficient to meet the requirement that every property has been inspected at a ten year interval as a minimum. The most recent encyclical inspection was commenced in December of 1992 and completed in December of 1997. Using these dates as a base the latest start date would be July of 2004 with a completion date of December 2007. The recommended start date of the Spring of 2001 and a completion date of the I'all of 2006. This time period would require an average of approximately 500 to 550 properties per year. This is not a large burden when considering the continuing benefit of good and current data. For this reason and in consideration of the compensation received a three member working board should be able to accomplish these goals. Any deviation in this commitment should result in a revision in the compensation to a less actively committed board.

Annual Town Report

The Communication Center has just gone through a rough year. This year we were advised that we would be shut down due to budget cuts and that all dispatching would be handled by the State Police in New Braintree. This came as a shock to all of us. All the dispatchers, along with the help from other departments, rallied together to get the word out on how important the Communication Center was to the residents of Lancaster. It was a long few months, but the work paid off. The residents of Lancaster came together to pass an override in support of the departments that were facing cut backs. We all thank you for you support and believing in the work we do.

E911 was installed this year and has shown it's importance with the emergency calls that we are receiving on it. There were some changes that had to be made in programing, but it has proved to be just what it stands for, Enhanced 911. E911 provides us with a name, address and phone number. Should we get disconnected from the caller, we have the necessary information needed to call back. We investigate all hang up calls with a call back and an officer's visit to the location the call originated from. Some of these calls have proven to be very interesting. For example, some reasons for hanging up are, the cat hit the button, toddler playing with the phone or kids just seeing what will happen when they dial 911. We would like to stress that 911 is for emergencies only and should be used just for that. General calls should be placed on 368-1380 or 368-1411.

The burning season was a busy one, especially the last month. Five hundred forty five permits were recorded in April and the total for the season was 895. Messages for the Fire Department were well over 200 which includes oil burner inspections, home inspections for smoke detectors and oil tank removals.

We have had an in-house computer for over a year. During the last full year, we have logged a total of 5383 calls. This total doesn't include calls taken for the dog officer, animal control, DPW after hours, Board of Health, callers calling from out of town for directions or just general calls.

I would like to express my appreciation to everyone one who assisted us during the past year, Acting Chief Lamb and his officers, Chief McLaughlin, Capt. Everett Moody and the DPW workers.

To all of the dispatchers who work hard to help all the residents in Lancaster and other towns, I thank you. Full time dispatchers: Marilyn Moran, Marilyn Gaughan and Patricia Pultorak, part time dispatchers: Regina Baer, Kenneth Calder, Jason Ryan, Jennifer Janda, Robert Moody and Jeffrey Stevenson.

Lancaster Council on Aging

The Lancaster Council on Aging provides and coordinates valuable services and benefits for the town's nine hundred senior citizens. Council on Aging members are volunteers appointed by the Board of Selectmen. The Council on Aging employs a part-time Director to implement activities and services.

The Council on Aging had another very productive year, providing valuable services and benefits to the town at little or no cost. The Council receives grants from the state Executive Office of Elder Affairs to supplement its budget. The Council's activities are supported by organizations such as the Montachusett Area Regional Transit Authority (MART), the Montachusett Opportunity Council (MOC), and the Montachusett Home Care Corporation (MHCC). The activities and services included:

- 1. Senior Citizens Van: The Council continued to operate a van to transport the town's elders and handicapped to medical appointments, the meals program, shopping, and other activities. The Montachusett Area Regional Transit Authority (MART) provides the van and pays for insurance, gasoline, maintenance, and driver wages. MART also pays for and maintains the van's two-way radio.
- 2. Lunch Program: The lunch program for the elderly continued three days each week at Bigelow Gardens. The Montachusett Opportunity Council (MOC) estimates that they provided 5, 149 congregate and home delivered meals in FY1997, while Atlantic Union College prepared many vegetarian meals. In addition, MCI continued to serve meals every Thursday at no cost to Lancaster senior citizens. A \$1,500 special article that is part of the Council's budget helps to fund the lunch program. The overall value of the meals received from MOC is \$20.312.81.

 Wednesday meals are being served this year "family style" due to participation increase.
- 3. Home Care Program: The Council continued its home care program, funded through a \$600 special article as part of the Council's budget. The care is provided by the Montachusett Home Care Corporation (MHCC) and includes homemaker, personal care, home-delivered meal, adult day health, and transportation services valued at about \$30,000. MHCC also provides visits for case manager services, a volunteer program (companionship, friendly visitors, telephone reassurance, budget counseling, escort services, grocery shopping, meal preparation, food stamp pickup, and benefit counseling), nursing, adult family care, and elders at risk.
- 4. Thanksgiving Dinner: The Council sponsored the annual Thanksgiving dinner for Lancaster's senior citizens. Approximately 100 of the town's senior citizens attended. The dinner was held at MCI in Lancaster, and MCI volunteers served the dinner.
- 5. <u>Perkins School</u> hosted a holiday luncheon for the Lancaster Senior Citizens in December in their school dinning room.
 - 6. Newsletter: The Council's monthly Lancaster Senior Citizens Newsletter

continued to be successful. The newsletter is distributed to all of the town's senior citizens. Senior Citizens Publishing Company prints the newsletter at no cost to the town, saving about \$100 per month in printing costs.

- 7. Health Fair and Clinics: The Council on Aging sponsored a health fair and flu vaccine clinics to benefit senior citizens. The health fair and clinics were attended by many of the town's elders. The Lancaster Board of Health participated in the health fair. The fair and clinics featured flu vaccinations and blood pressure screening.
- 8. Information Day: In April the Council on Aging will be having a Senior Citizen Information Day at the Lancaster Town Hall. Secure Horizons will be sponsoring this event.
- 9. Senior Network: The Council on Aging continued its association with the Senior Network, which provides posters each month displaying up-to-date information of interest to senior citizens. The posters are placed at Bigelow Gardens. For participating, the Senior Network funds about \$120 annually to the Council on Aging that is provided to Alert to support a senior citizen summer function.
- 10. <u>Senior Pharmacy Program:</u> The Council has implemented a Pharmacy Assistance Program funded by the state of Massachusetts. Eligible seniors may receive up to \$700 per year for certain prescription drugs.
- 11. Grant: The Massachusetts Department of Elder Affairs will be awarding the Council a grant for over \$4,000. One of the uses for the grant is to help fund postage for the senior citizens monthly newsletter. Also, this year we hope to purchase and set-up a computer with Internet capabilities and one that is IBM compatible.

To see if the Town will vote to appropriate from the Water Enterprise Fund the sum of \$458,181, more or less, to fund the operation of the Water Department for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 1997 (detail below), or act in any manner relating thereto. Recommended.

ARTICLE 11 (Board of Public Works and Water Enterprise Fund)

To see if the Town will vote to appropriate from Water Enterprise Available Funds, the sum of \$50,000, to be expended by the Board of Public Works for capital improvements, or act in any manner relating thereto. Recommended.

ARTICLE 12 (Board of Public Works)

To see if the Town will vote to take \$243,041 from available funds to be expended by the Board of Public Works for capital improvements on local roads, said funds to be 100% reimbursed by the Commonwealth of Massachusetts under the relevant Acts of 1997, or act in any manner relating thereto. Recommended.

ARTICLE 13 (Board of Public Works)

To see if the Town will vote to trade-in one 1980 dump truck with snow plow as partial payment for one new 1997-1998 dump truck and plow, or act in any manner relating thereto. Recommendation from the floor.

ARTICLE 14 (Board of Selectmen)

To see if the Town will vote to authorize the following Revolving Funds in accordance with M.G.L. Ch. 44, s.53E 1/2, or act in any manner relating thereto: Recommended.

- 1. Town Forest Revolving Fund: May be expended by the Town Forest Committee on improvements to the Town Forest. Receipts from the sale of Town Forest products and gifts shall be credited to the fund. Total expenditures from the fund shall not exceed \$3,400.
- 2. Tax Title Account Revolving Fund: May be expended by the Collector-Treasurer on Tax Title Taking legal expenses. Payments from Tax Title receipts shall be credited to the revolving fund. Total expenditures from the fund shall not exceed \$30,000.
- 3. Veterans Memorial Revolving Fund: May be expended by the Board of Selectmen on a new memorial for veterans of wars. Gifts and Town Meeting appropriations shall be credited to the fund. Total expenditures from the fund shall not exceed \$3,400.
- 4. M.A.R.T. Revolving Fund: May be expended by the Council on Aging for the operation of the Senior van. Reimbursements from M.A.R.T. shall be credited to the fund. Total expenditures shall not exceed \$34,000.

- 5. Council on Aging Revolving Fund: The purpose of this fund is to receive funds from advertising in the Lancaster Senior Citizens newsletter and to pay for printing and for mailing of the newsletter and for other activities that directly benefit the Town's senior citizens. The funds shall be under the control of the Board of Selectmen and the Council on Aging. Total expenditures from the fund shall not exceed \$4,000.
- 6. Planning Board Revolving Fund: May be expended by the Planning Board to defray reasonable expenses pertaining to public hearings for special permits, flexible, rapid, and major residential development, disturbance control departure, shared or extended driveways, preliminary and definitive subdivision applications, site plan review and zoning amendments and changes. Monies received shall be credited to the fund. Total expenditures from the fund shall not exceed \$20,000.
- 7. Recycling Revolving Fund: May be expended by the Recycling Committee to defray reasonable expenses. Gifts and the proceeds from the sale of recycled products shall be credited to the fund. Total expenditures from the fund shall not exceed \$6.000.
- 8. Worker's Compensation Advance Revolving Fund: May be expended by the Board of Selectmen on advances to employees eligible for Worker's Compensation benefits. Reimbursements from the employee, upon receipt of the benefit check, shall be credited to the revolving fund. Total expenditures from the fund shall not exceed \$5,000.
- 9. Publications Reprinting Revolving Fund: May be expended by the Town Clerk for reprinting of publications which are circulated for a fee. Receipts from the sale of publications shall be credited to the fund. Total expenditures from the fund shall not exceed \$5,000.
- 10. Dog Licensing Revolving Fund: May be expended by the Town Clerk to compensate the Town Clerk or Assistant Town Clerk for the licensing of dogs. One dollar and fifty cents (\$1.50) from each dog license fee received shall be credited to the fund. Total expenditures from the fund shall not exceed \$1,500.
- 11. Cross Connection Program Revolving Fund: May be expended by the Board of Public Works to defray the cost of implementing the cross connection program mandated by DEP. Receipts from survey and inspection charges shall be credited to the fund. Total expenditures from the fund shall not exceed \$5,000.
- 12. Library Book Fines Revolving Fund: May be expended by the Library Trustees on books and materials. Payments for overdue books, magazines and non-print materials shall be credited to the fund. Total expenditures from the fund shall not exceed \$1,000.

ARTICLE 15 (Finance Committee)

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100,000 to be transferred to the Reserve Fund, or act in any manner relating thereto. Recommended.

ARTICLE 16 (Board of Selectmen)

To see if the Town will vote recommend to the Board of Selectmen to commit \$31,924 from Prison Expansion Mitigation Grant Funds to purchase and equip a new 1997 four-wheel drive utility vehicle and to authorize a trade in or disposal of one 1994 Ford police cruiser, or act in any manner relating thereto. Recommended.

ARTICLE 17 (Board of Selectmen)

To see if the Town will vote to recommend to the Board of Selectmen to commit \$33,556 from Prison Expansion Mitigation Funds to supplement a U.S. Department of Justice COPS MORE Grant of \$36,000 to install three mobile information systems into the three Police vehicles, or act in any manner relating thereto. Recommended.

ARTICLE 18 (Board of Selectmen)

To see if the Town will vote to reallocate its required share of the Minuteman Regional Vocational Technical School District budget in accordance with the Regional Agreement as permitted by Section 16B of Chapter 71 of the General Laws, or act in any manner relating thereto. Recommended.

ARTICLE 19 (Planning Board)

To see if the Town will vote to amend the Lancaster Zoning Bylaw so as to amend the Zoning Map references in Section 2.20 of the Lancaster Zoning Bylaw by removing from the "R" (Residential) District and including in the "GI" (General Industry) District that land North of the New York, New Haven and Hartford Railroad and south of Sterling Road which is designated on the Town of Lancaster Assessors' Maps as Sheet 40, Lot 14-A that is not presently in the "GI" district, such that all of said lot will be included in the "GI" district, or act in any manner relating thereto.

ARTICLE 20 (Board of Selectmen)

To see if the Town will vote to accept as a public way a certain parcel of land being the street located within the Bates Estates Subdivision, situated off the easterly side of Sterling Street (Route 62) in the Town of Lancaster, County of Worcester, Commonwealth of Massachusetts, being known as White Tail Lane, formerly known as Lois Lane, as shown on a definitive subdivision plan entitled "Bates Estates, 'Lancaster, Msss.", prepared for the Bates Family Realty Trust by Seltec Engineering, Inc., dated March 29, 1989, and recorded with the Worcester District Registry of Deeds in Plan Book 644, Plan 32, bounded and described on a plan of land on file in the Office of the Town Clerk, or act in any manner relating thereto.

ARTICLE 21 (Board of Selectmen)

To see if the Town will vote to accept the provisions of Section 26H of Chapter 148 of Massachusetts General

Laws, requiring lodging and boarding houses be protected with an adequate system of automatic sprinklers in accordance with the provisions of the state building code, or act in any manner relating thereto.

ARTICLE 22 (Board of Selectmen)

To see if the Town will vote to accept the provisions of Section 26I of Chapter 148 of Massachusetts General Law, requiring installation of automatic fire sprinkler systems in buildings with four (4) or more dwelling units which are constructed or substantially rehabilitated, or act in any manner relating thereto.

ARTICLE 23 (Board of Selectmen)

To see if the Town will vote to amend the Street Numbering Bylaw approved under Article 20 of the 1996 Annual Town Meeting and replacing it with the following, or act in any manner relating thereto.

By-Law Relative to Street Numbering

- I. Street numbers shall be attached to each residential dwelling, business, industry, and all other buildings in the Town of Lancaster.
- II. The number shall be made of permanent, weatherproof materials, shall be not less than three inches (3") in height and in contrasting color to the building surface, and, shall be clearly visible from the street or roadway upon which the structure fronts.
- III. Any structure that is not visible from the street or roadway shall have the assigned number posted on a suitable support at the primary entrance to the driveway that services such structure.
- IV. Numbers posted shall be assigned to the structure by the Building Inspector at the time the building permit is issued.
- V. It shall be the responsibility of the property owner to obtain, display, and maintain the assigned street number within ninety (90) days of passage of this by-law.

ARTICLE 24 (Board of Selectmen)

To see if the Town will vote to adopt the following General Bylaw, or act in any manner relating thereto.

MUNICIPAL CONTRACTS - Unless otherwise provided by a vote of Town Meeting, each board or officer having responsibility for a particular appropriation is hereby authorized to enter into any contract for the expenditure of such appropriation, on such terms and conditions, including the length of contracts, which such board or officer deems appropriate. The Board of Selectmen is hereby authorized to enter into contracts for all matters not specifically under the jurisdiction or responsibility of any other board or officer. Notwithstanding the foregoing, no board or officer of the Town shall contract for any purpose, on any terms, or under any conditions inconsistent with any applicable provision of any general or special law. Recommended.

ARTICLE 25 (Board of Selectmen)

To see if the Town will vote to accept the provisions of Massachusetts General Law Chapter 40, section 22F, which provides any municipal board or officer empowered to issue a license, permit, certificate, or to render a service or perform work for a person or class of persons, may, from time to time, fix reasonable fees for such items or services, and to adopt the following Administrative Bylaw: MUNICIPAL LICENSE & PERMIT FEES - All fees fixed by boards or officers under the Board of Selectmen pursuant to G.L. Chapter 40, section 22F shall take effect upon the approval of the Board of Selectmen, or act in any manner relating thereto. Recommended.

ARTICLE 26 (Board of Selectmen)

To see if the Town will vote to adopt the following administrative by-law, or act in any manner relating thereto:

Section 1. The Annual Town Meeting for the transaction of business shall be held on the evening of the first Monday in May at 7:30 P.M. The Annual Town Meeting may, by a two-thirds vote of the Board of Selectmen, be postponed to a later date, however, the transaction of the Town's business must be completed no later than June 30. The Selectmen shall give notice of all Town Meetings by posting attested copies of the Warrant at the Town Hall. Fifth Meeting House, Center Post Office and South Lancaster Post Office and publishing same in a newspaper of local circulation at least seven (7) days before an Annual Town Meeting and fourteen (14) days before a Special Town Meeting.

Section II. The Annual Election of Town Officers shall be held on the second Monday in May. The poils shall open at 10:00 A.M. and remain open until 8:00 P.M. and shall be so stated in the Warrant calling the Annual Town Election.

and, to rescind the following votes: A vote taken at the March, 1859 Annual Town Meeting relative to "notification of future Town Meetings"; A vote taken at the March, 1879 Annual Town Meeting relative to "holding of the Annual Meeting"; Articles 1 and 3 of the April, 1880 Annual Town Meeting; Article 20 of the March 19, 1900 Annual Town Meeting; Article 15 of the March 16, 1936 Annual Town Meeting; Article 13 of the February 12, 1945 Annual Town Meeting; Article 39 of the February 12, 1951 Annual Town Meeting; Article 6 of the September 19, 1973 Special Town Meeting; Article 22 of 1980 Annual Town Meeting; and, Article 18 of September 27, 1994 Special Town Meeting.

ARTICLE 27 (Board of Selectmen and Town Clerk) To see of the Town will vote to petition the Legislature to adopt the following special act, or act in any manner relating thereto:

AN ACT CREATING AN APPOINTED TOWN CLERK IN THE TOWN OF LANCASTER

Section I. Notwithstanding the provisions of any general or special law to the contrary, the office of Town Clerk in the Town of Lancaster shall be appointed by the Board of Selectmen for a term of three years and upon such other terms and conditions as the Selectmen determine.

Section II. The individual holding the position of Town Clerk on the date of acceptance of this Act by the voters shall continue to serve until the term to which he/she was elected expires, at which time, the Office of Town Clerk shall be subject to appointment.

Section III. This act shall become effective upon acceptance by the voters.

To hear the report of any outstanding committees and to act thereon.

To choose any committee or committees that may be thought necessary.

And you are directed to serve this Warrant by posting up attested copies thereof at the South Lancaster Post Office, the Center Post Office, the Brick Meeting House and the Town Hall, in said Town seven days at least before the time for holding said meeting. Hereof fail not and make due return of the Warrant with your doings thereon to the Town Clerk at the time and place of meeting aforesaid.

- 4. M.A.R.T. Revolving Fund: May be expended by the Council on Aging for the operation of the Senior van. Reimbursements from M.A.R.T. shall be credited to the fund. Total expenditures shall not exceed \$34,000.
- 5. Council on Aging Revolving Fund: The purpose of this fund is to receive funds from advertising in the Lancaster Senior Citizens newsletter and to pay for printing and for mailing of the newsletter and for other activities that directly benefit the Town's senior citizens. The funds shall be under the control of the Board of Selectmen and the Council on Aging. Total expenditures from the fund shall not exceed \$4,000.

- 6. Planning Board Revolving Fund: May be expended by the Planning Board to defray reasonable expenses pertaining to public hearings for special permits, flexible, rapid, and major residential development, disturbance control departure, shared or extended driveways, preliminary and definitive subdivision applications, site plan review and zoning amendments and changes. Monies received shall be credited to the fund. Total expenditures from the fund shall not exceed \$20,000.
- 7. Recycling Revolving Fund: May be expended by the Recycling Committee to defray reasonable expenses. Gifts and the proceeds from the sale of recycled products shall be credited to the fund. Total expenditures from the fund shall not exceed \$6,000.
- 8. Worker's Compensation Advance Revolving Fund: May be expended by the Board of Selectmen on advances to employees eligible for Worker's Compensation benefits. Reimbursements from the employee, upon receipt of the benefit check, shall be credited to the revolving fund. Total expenditures from the fund shall not exceed \$5,000.
- 9. Publications Reprinting Revolving Fund: May be expended by the Town Clerk for reprinting of publications which are circulated for a fee. Receipts from the sale of publications shall be credited to the fund. Total expenditures from the fund shall not exceed \$5,000.
- 10. Dog Licensing Revolving Fund: May be expended by the Town Clerk to compensate the Town Clerk or Assistant Town Clerk for the licensing of dogs. One dollar and fifty cents (\$1.50) from each dog license fee received shall be credited to the fund. Total expenditures from the fund shall not exceed \$1,500.
- 11. Cross Connection Program Revolving Fund: May be expended by the Board of Public Works to defray the cost of implementing the cross connection program mandated by DEP. Receipts from survey and inspection charges shall be credited to the fund. Total expenditures from the fund shall not exceed \$5,000.
- 12. Library Book Fines Revolving Fund: May be expended by the Library Trustees on books and materials. Payments for overdue books, magazines and non-print materials shall be credited to the fund. Total expenditures from the fund shall not exceed \$1,000.

ARTICLE 15 (Finance Committee)

It was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100,000 to be transferred to the Reserve Fund.

ARTICLE 16 (Board of Selectmen)

- II. The number shall be made of permanent, weather-proof materials, shall be not less than three inches (3") and not more than six inches (6") in height and in contrasting color to the building surface, and shall be clearly visible from the street or roadway upon which the structure fronts.
- III. Any structure that is not visible from the street or roadway shall have the assigned number posted on a suitable support at the primary entrance to the driveway that services such structure.
- IV. Numbers posted shall be assigned to the structure by the Building Inspector at the time the building permit is issued.
- V. It shall be the responsibility of the property owner to obtain, display, and maintain the assigned street number within ninety (90) days of passage of this by-law.

ARTICLE 24 (Board of Selectmen)

It was voted to adopt the following General Bylaw:

MUNICIPAL CONTRACTS - Unless otherwise provided by a vote of Town Meeting, each board or officer having responsibility for a particular appropriation is hereby authorized to enter into any contract for the expenditure of such appropriation, on such terms and conditions, including the length of contracts, which such board or officer deems appropriate. The Board of Selectmen is hereby authorized to enter into contracts for all matters not specifically under the jurisdiction or responsibility of any other board or officer. Notwithstanding the foregoing, no board or officer of the Town shall contract for any purpose, on any terms, or under any conditions inconsistent with any applicable provision of any general or special law.

MUNICIPAL LICENSE & PERMIT FEES - All fees fixed by boards or officers under the Board of Selectmen pursuant to G.L. Chapter 40, section 22F shall take effect upon the approval of the Board of Selectmen.

ARTICLE 26 (Board of Selectmen)

Section 1. The Annual Town Meeting for the transaction of business shall be held on the evening of the first Monday in May at 7:30 P.M. The Selectmen shall give notice of all Town Meetings by posting attested copies of the Warrant at the Town Hall, Fifth Meeting House, Center Post Office and South Lancaster Post Office and publishing same in a newspaper of local circulation at least seven (7) days before an Annual Town Meeting and fourteen (14) days before a Special Town Meeting.

Section II. The Annual Election of Town Officers shall be held on the second Monday in May. The polls shall open at 10:00 A.M. and remain open until 8:00 P.M. and shall be so stated in the Warrant calling the Annual Town Election.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE DOG OFFICER

Things are still busy in the animal world. This office answered 900 calls and complaints pertaining to dogs in 1997. 28 dog bites were reported to our office. 166 fines were issued to residents who failed to license their dogs in 1997. These fines should bring \$4,000 of revenue into the town. 17 fines were written to residents whose dogs are "repeat offenders" bring \$425 of revenue into the town. Again, my goal for 1998 is to have all dogs licensed. Remember that all dog licenses expire march 31st. Current rabies certificate must be presented at the time you apply for a license or renewal. Please see the Town Clerk to obtain your dog licenses. Failure to do so will result in late fees and fines.

Many stray dogs were picked up. Most were not claimed and we had to find new homes for them.

Things seem to slip backward and people who own dogs get lax about their responsibilities. We strive for good animal control but we also need people to take responsibility for their dogs and keep them at home where they belong so that the residents of Lancaster can live safely and enjoy the Town the way they should.

Let's not forget people and pubic safety come first, next animals and their safety.

We placed two Ice Rescue suits and equipment in service along with 17 Firefighters becoming certified in Ice Rescue techniques. A formal class was conducted which included actual ice rescue evolutions this past January on South Meadow Pond.

We are asking the voters to replace our 1971 American LaFrance Pumper which is now 28 years old. It is our first run piece of fire apparatus protecting South Lancaster.

Fire Prevention is the most important service we provide. If we can eliminate fires before they start, we have accomplished a great deal by eliminating financial and personal loss. It lowers insurance ratings and makes Lancaster a safer place to live, work and play. Please join us in a much more proactive role with Fire Prevention. The life we save maybe your own.

Reminder, all non-compliant underground storage tanks without leak detection equipment must be removed by 12/22/98. Do not wait until the last minute. Serious fines are mandated by State Law. Any questions, please call us.

We wish to thank the Lancaster Ambulance, Communications Center, DPW and Police for their continued assistance and ongoing support. Most importantly, we wish to acknowledge the continued dedication and commitment of our Firefighters. Their professionalism and loyalty to the Town is greatly appreciated by the Board of Fire Engineers especially today where time is our most precious and limited commodity.

Boards of Health in Massachusetts are required by State statute to perform many essential duties regarding public health, disease control, sanitary living conditions and the environment. Since it is recognized that certain critical health problems are best handled by involving local officials more familiar with community conditions, the personal mission of the members of the Lancaster Board of Health is to protect and promote the physical and environmental well-being of our residents and our Town

Board Activity:

1997 was the "Year of the Asphalt Plant" II! After many more meetings and endless discussion of the pros & cons of the controversial blacktop processing facility to be built off Lunenburg Rd., the Board of Health held a lengthy Public Hearing in July. The Board's determination was that the proposed asphalt plant may be a noisome trade (as that term is used in G.L.c.111, s.143), and that Leominster Materials Corp. must submit a site-assignment application prior to construction or operation. LMC has objected and filed a lawsuit against the Town of Lancaster:

Title 5 septic system inspections, now required prior to the sale of a home since 1995 changes to the State Environmental Code, are received and reviewed by Nashoba Associated Boards of Health and filed at the Board Office. 51 private inspections were done during the year (based on 138 to date; 84% have passed). Local ugrade approval for failed or nonconforming systems must also be granted by the Board and forms sent in to the State. The Town of Lancaster and the Board of Health began preliminary steps to participate in the DEP Community Septic Management Program, a loan program to assist qualified homeowners in upgrading failing septic systems, and/or connecting costs for homes not yet connected but accessible to the public sewer. In 1997 \$18,000 was awarded for the Board of Health to develop a local septic system database, create a rating system based on public health and environmental sensitivity, and track local septic systems. However, this eagerly-anticipated program was put "on hold" until essential operating details are finalized: Presently, only several low-cost bank loans and the new government tax credit are available to home owners for septic system repairs.

A tremendous increase in new home construction was noted in Town. 64 new and upgraded septic permits and 42 well permits were issued. William Brookings, NABH Sanitarian processes the applications and performs the inspections. He is available every Wednesday at the Lancaster Board of Health Office from 8:00-9:00 a.m. for consultation. He also does on-site complaint investigations, attends monthly Board meetings and coordinates Variance letters and correspondence with the Secretary. He is our indispensable technical advisor.

NABH issued 15 massage, 5 swimming pool, 3 camps for children, 1 tanning salon and 1 funeral director's license. 80 food service inspections were done; 36 licenses issued. One complaint was received of a bandaid baked in a cookie. A certificate of occupancy for a farm labor camp was received from the DPH.

The landfill, capped in 1994, has continued to require only minimal maintenance and appears to be in excellent shape, according to inspections made by John Farnsworth, our landfill consultant and videomonitoring by Stanley Roberts. Only one mowing was required in 1997. Satisfactory water quality testing results were received; gas & water monitoring will continue according to DEP specifications.

The Board licensed 6 trash haulers: McRell Rubbish Removal, Sons of Kristoff, United Waste Systems, Casaceli Trucking, Waste Management and BFI, collecting \$580 in fees (no charge for recycling trucks.) Private pick-up for rubbish is now in its seventh year, with no complaints reported. Note: due to liability considerations, residents are urged to contract only with these approved businesses.

Our Office has received over 600 phone calls and responded to a myriad of complaints, ranging from housing, health and safety, rodents, sewage breakouts, manure, illegal dumping & overflowing dumpsters, hazardous materials, noise and nuisances -- to emergency situations (sewage breakouts.) Two abandoned properties were referred to Selectmen and the Building Inspector for action after Orders to Correct Violations were issued from the Board of Health. Emissions from idling school busses were promised to be halted by the contractor. Numerous persons were provided with information and/or referral to the appropriate agency. The Board worked with Mass. Dept. of Public Health, Dept. of Environmental Protection, Environmental Police, Div. of Fisheries & Wildlife, MSPCA, Mass. Farm Bureau, Mass. Assoc. Health Boards, Central Mass. Assoc. BOH, Community Health Networks & Prevention Centers, NRWA, Clinton Board of Health, Clinton Senior Center, Lancaster Recycling Center, Volunteer Humane Society, Lancaster Council on Aging, and Building Inspector James J. Ford. Three proposed Sub-Divisions were reviewed for the Planning Board: off Sterling Rd., off Fire Rd. 3, off Lee St. Material available at the Office included a variety of Public Health Facts Sheets (lead paint, lyme disease, bird & reptile safety, salmonella, immunizations, etc.), smoking cessation, lists of soil evaluators, septic system inspectors, smoke-free dining and safe & sanitary housing, flood plain & sewer district maps, births & deaths data and spay/neuter certificates.

Burial Agent: 21 burial permits issued; 48 death certificates processed.

Animal Disposal Agent: The Dead Animal Control Log from January-December, 1997 reports 47 animals were removed from Lancaster roads and buried: 13 raccoons, 8 cats, 3 dogs, 3 deer, 9 skunks, 5 opossums, 4 squirrels, 1 muskrat and 1 porcupine.

Raccoon rabies has not died off — in fact, since it peaks in 3-4 year cycles — it is most important (and the State law) to vaccinate all dogs and cats to protect yourself and them against this deadly disease. 39 dogs and 45 cats were vaccinated at the LBOH-NABH rabies clinics. Rabies can also be carried by bats, foxes, skunks, domestic livestock and possibly ferrets. All exposures to potentially rabid wildlife should be carefully evaluated, especially bats, unless any contact can be definitely ruled out. Of 19 animals tested from Lancaster in 1997 (10 raccoons, 7 skunks, 1 woodchuck, 1 bat) 11 were rabid. 12 persons received the rabies innoculation series at NNS.

Town Health Services: Nashoba Nursing Service, acting as our 'Public Health Nurse', provides essential professional services for the Board of Health in community assessment, policy development, health promotion, disease prevention and surveillance. 77 persons attended the free monthly "Well

Adult Clinic" for blood pressure testing, cholesterol & blood sugar screening here at the Town Hall. Topics covered were nutrition, osteoporosis, housekeeping, communicable diseases, environmental safety and home injury control, stress reduction, mental health, women's issues, health care proxy and medical directives. More Lancaster residents were served at their Harvard facility for lead screening, weight management and the Caregivers Support Program. Hepatitis B immunizations will be administered by NNS to interested municipal employees, and wellness programs begun to aid them in passing their service physical abilities tests. For the fourth year, we co-sponsored the annual Town Hall Health Fair with the Council on Aging. 126 flu, 11 pneumonia & 3 tetanus/diptheria shots were given to the 160 persons who attended this popular event. Compliance checks re: tobacco sales to minors by merchants were conducted by D.A.R.E. in conjunction with the NABH Tobacco Control Program. The Board posted DPH warnings on infectious diseases such as TB, hepatitis B, STDs, meningitis, and on food-borne ilnesses from drinking unpasteurized cider.

The Lancaster Board of Health commends Lancaster's own "Mrz Roberts", Stanley Roberts, (retired in May) for his many years of dedicated and dependable service to the community. Since 1984, he has served at various times as Board member, Animal Inspector, and Animal Control Officer, as well as being a Constable and Special Police Officer. He was the true definition of a 'public servant', who maintained a good working relationship with everyone, motivated only by a sincere desire to help those in need.

In contrast, it has been another year of turmoil and dissension within the Board. Disagreements on minor as well as major issues were an ongoing problem. A sincere thankyou to residents of the Town who have followed the ongoing saga..and to those who supported us in spite of controversy. Our ever-steady and competent Administrative Secretary, Eileen McRell has been the glue to hold together a sometimes battered and fragmented Board. A sincere vote of appreciation to her and her hard work throughout the year.

Looking Ahead to 1998

It is our sincere hope that current and future members will restore harmony to the Board and join together to work for their common goal -- guarding the public health.

Nashoba Associated Boards of Health continues to serve the local Board of Health in meeting the challenges of environmental and public health needs in Lancaster. In 1997 the work demands associated with the new Title 5 state septic system regulations continued. Fortunately the processes are becoming smoother as we all become familiar with the many changes. In addition, the Nursing Service has met the enormous changes confronting health care everywhere. We have done this at Nashoba without increasing costs to the town. We look forward to continuing our work with the Lancaster Board of Health. Included in highlights of 1997 are the following:

- Oversight review responsibility for Lancaster Board of Health for 51 Title 5 State mandated private Septic System Inspections (138 since 3/95, 84% passed). Filed and reviewed 868 state mandated (but unfunded) Nashoba area Title 5 inspections in 1997. (total 2418 since 3/95).
- Continued Dental Program in Local Schools
- Sustained level local funding of Nashoba Environmental Assessment for ninth year in a row!
- Represented Nashoba members on Executive Committee of Massachusetts Association of Health Boards (MAHB).
- Invited and presented Internet information at Quarterly Meeting of the Central Massachusetts Association of Health Boards. (see nashoba.org homepage)

Lancaster Historical Commission Annual Report for 1997

In 1997 the Commission was chaired by Anne Androski. The members were Marjorie Adams, Anne Androski, David Knott, Henry Paszko, Jack Pirozzolo, Michael Sczerzen and Imogene Watson. Jack Pirozzolo resigned from the Commission and the vacancy will be filled in January of 1998.

During the four hours one day a week of providing service to the public over 30 persons visited the office with requests for historical research and genealogical information. We were able to return to the General Fund \$346.40 from the sale of books and research copy work. We continue to answer correspondence and telephone calls which aid townspeople and the general public regarding historical Lancaster.

Commission members continue to seek donations to fund a marker for "Sliding Billy" Hamilton who is buried in Eastwood Cemetery. He was inducted into the Baseball Hall of Fame in 1961. Anyone wishing to give a donation can do so through the Commission.

Changes around Lancaster: The Mill Street bridge was closed down for repairs. The house at 892 Main Street suffered an internal house fire. This house's name plate is recorded as the "Benjamin Foster House" which was build c. 1800. The L portion of the house in the back was constructed from a section of the 4th Meeting House in 1823. The front portion was added in 1871. Thanks to the efficient work of our Fire Department, the exterior of the house was not damaged by the fire.

The Commission toured the Old Settlers' Burial Grounds and Middle Cemetery to address the issue of damage done to markers from nature and recently by vandals spray painting or pushing over markers. The office coordinator, Joan Richards, attended a workshop at Massachusetts Historical Commission in Boston in December pertaining for State Preservation Project Funding available to towns and non-profit organizations for projects of restoration. A photographic inventory of the markers has been started as well as the Commission talking to professionals to learn how to properly restore damaged markers. We plan to update the written history of each stone using the inventory listed in Marvin's History of the Town of Lancaster. The Commission members has been actively attending Building Committee meetings pertaining to the restoration and addition to the Town Library and the Town Hall Feasibility Study. The historical significance of the Town buildings around the Town Green provide Lancaster with a rare treasure not found anywhere else in Massachusetts. We are investigating the process necessary to preserve this area as a Historic District.

During our 135th year of public library service to the citizens of Lancaster, the renovation and expansion of the Library's building continued to be our major preoccupation. In January 1997, the project's funding was assured when the four-year \$2.2 million debt exclusion ballot question (approved at a November 1996 Town Meeting) passed 698 to 422. Our architects — CBT / Childs Bertman Tseckares — did a masterful job of guiding us through design development and began to produce the construction drawings.

The Library's municipal appropriation for fiscal year 1998 (July 1, 1997 — June 30, 1998) was \$109,250 — a \$522 or less than one-half of a percent increase over the \$108,728 finally appropriated for FY 1997 after a \$3,100 reduction. (The actual municipal expenditure for FY 1997 was \$108,461.09.) Our original budget request included funding for increased hours — addition of Mondays or Wednesday mornings to the schedule — but it was defeated. The Library maintained the same hours of operation as in 1995 and 1996: 32 hours per week in the winter and 28 hours per week in the summer. The Library maintained its state certification by remaining open at least 25 hours per week, meeting the minimum Municipal Appropriation Requirement (MAR), and spending at least 19% of its operating budget on books and materials. In FY 1996 the

Library received \$8,813.25 in state aid, in FY 1997 \$7,696.43, and in FY 1998 \$7,084.80 — all of which is applied to wages and salaries. As our wage and salary requirements go up, our state aid declines!

Circulation at the end of fiscal year 1997 was 50,069 — a decline of 2,416 items or 4.6% compared to FY 1996's 52,485. The average annual circulation for the past ten years is 49,403.

3,814 patrons were actively registered with the Library as of December 31, 1997. This figure is much smaller than last year (7,244) because our files were purged of all inactive patron records for the first time since we began using the C/W MARS network. The Library's holdings totaled 50,019, a net gain of 1,922 over the 48,097 items in the collection at the end of 1996. The collection received a boost from the distribution of 313 books from the former Davis Library at Fort Devens, the gift of over 180 video cassettes from an anonymous donor, and a special order of about 36 audio books. Daniel Laughlin donated 10 more boxes of current hardcover books and Jeanette Stickney continues to donate large print books.

The Friends of the Library contributed funds from their annual fall book sale toward the purchase of audio books, the Library's membership in the Wachusetts Co-op for circulating collections of video and children's programs. They sponsored a children's holiday concert by Rick Goldin in December. In addition, all of the Library's museum passes (Boston Museum of Fine Arts, John F. Kennedy Presidential Library and Museum, Worcester Art Museum, Higgins Armory Museum, Tower Hill Botanical Garden, and Fruitlands Museum) were provided by the Friends.

During 1997 C/W MARS was upgraded to a graphical TCP/IP network and we replaced four of our 286/386 computers with Pentiums to be compatible with the upgrade. We also began converting our OCR labels to bar codes in December.

On May 31, 1997, Cheryl A. Ryan and Mark Banta exchanged their wedding vows before family and friends in the Children's Room — a first in library history (as far as we know).

From March 6 through July 5, a 1903 imprint of the *Narrative of the Captivity and Restoration of Mrs. Mary Rowlandson* was on display at the Davis Museum and Cultural Center at Wellesley College as a part of the exhibit, "Inspiring Reform: Boston's Arts and Crafts Movement." The show will travel to the Renwick Gallery of the National Museum of American Art in Washington, DC in 1998.

Our volunteers continue to be an important resource to the Library: Janet Baylis repairs adult books, Norma McCarty reshelves books from the adult collection, Annette Morris

tends the gardens around the Library and supplies a holiday wreath for the front door, and Helen Mortimer repairs the books in the children's collection.

The Fund Raising and Building Committees — including the Library Trustees who are also members of each sub-committee — put in a lot of long hours toward the construction project. A benefit concert was held in February, a garden tour and ice cream social in July, a yard sale in October, and we sold flower bulbs, t-shirts, Christmas ornaments, and more. At the end of December over \$89,000 had been raised toward the four-year goal of \$400,000. We also received many in-kind donations from a number of friends: legal services from Choate, Hall & Stewart, loan of a cherry picker from Tree-1 Systems, fund raising "thermometer" painted by Ellen R. Donaldson, photography by Walter Doyle, printing and bulk mailing from Dunn & Company, site survey by John Farnsworth of DeFalco Engineering, excavation of test pits by Nathaniei C. Hawkins, Jr., review of construction documents by James L. Heighton, soil test borings and analysis by Technical Drilling Services, Inc., concert sponsorship and lots of free publicity from the Della Valles at the Lancaster Times.

Finally, it is the staff that makes the library a success. Their dedication, professionalism and team spirit keep this ship sailing smoothly. Thank you!

MINUTEMAN SCIENCE-TECHNOLOGY HIGH SCHOOL DISTRICT ANNUAL REPORT 1997

Beginning in September 1997, a group of seven Wayland High School students began spending two hours every morning at Minuteman Tech receiving career training experiences. Two students are taking carpentry, two students are taking electronics and three students are taking computer programming. Following their time at Minuteman, these students return to Wayland High School for their academics. Concord, too, is currently taking advantage of this program, and students from all of the other district high schools are also invited to participate.

The program is being run under the auspices of the School-to-Careers Partnership in which Wayland, Concord and other Minuteman district towns have been participating for the past year. In a time when demands on schools are increasing and resources are diminishing, it is very important that schools find creative ways of working together to provide the broadest and best possible education for their students. The Wayland-Minuteman program provides Wayland students with an opportunity for hands-on learning experiences which were no longer possible after the school closed its industrial arts program for budgetary reasons.

Another example of creative partnerships with district towns is our middle school technical literacy program. With the participating schools paying for the equipment and supplies, Minuteman Tech provides four teachers who work full-time giving hands-on technology education to students at the Acton-Boxborough Junior High and at middle schools in Bolton, Concord, Lancaster, Lexington, Lincoln and Sudbury. This includes an exposure to biotechnology, environmental technology, robotics, telecommunications, microelectronics, mechanics and technology projects.

For other district middle schools, Minuteman sponsors Technology Days during which more than 200 students from district middle schools and their science teachers are invited to spent a day in Minuteman Tech-nology labs doing hands-on activities in robotics, electronics and other technical disciplines. Schools register for the program on a first come, first served basis.

Minuteman service to district middle school students also includes the very popular After School program which provides hands-on career exploration and academic enrichment opportunities on Tuesdays and Thursday afternoons during October and on Monday and Wednesday afternoons during March. The 4:15 to 6:15 p.m. program is offered without charge to district 6th, 7th and 8th graders with transportation provided from district middle schools to Minuteman and return.

These middle school programs are all financed by the Minuteman Tech budget, and each town which participates is assessed on the basis of the number of full-time-equivalent (FTE) students served. This FTE number is computed by dividing the number of students served and the number of hours they are served by the number of hours a full-time daytime student is served. Since service to the part-time

"FTE" pupils is paid for by the Minuteman budget, the FTE pupils are included in the count with the regular day pupils in computing Minuteman's expenditure per pupil.

National studies indicate that properly funded vocational programs cost an average of two times as much as non-vocational programs in order to fund safe staffing ratios, properly related academic classes and up-to-date equipment. In addition, it costs more to educate special needs students, and 43% of member town high school students currently attending Minuteman need special education services. This is almost three times higher than the percentage of special education students enrolled in member town high schools and well above the common 30% to 32% in many regional vocational schools.

One of the ways in which Minuteman manages to keeps its technical programs up-to-date while surviving fiscal pressures is by the staff working diligently at seeking grants. This is especially important for the higher start-up investments required to begin or to change a technology program, often when enrollment and job opportunities are just beginning.

By working closely with industry, Minuteman focuses on the constant updating needed to prepare students for jobs of tomorrow rather than for jobs of yesterday. This special effort by the staff greatly amplifies the investment from local taxpayers, giving students and their communities a very high return in long-term economic value for each local dollar invested. There is an important relationship here. Strong local investment attracts investments from companies, government and foundations that lead to a high level of quality in career learning. So far during 1997, more than \$1.4 million has been received in grants for program improvements, growth of new science/technology career training and educational support for enrolled students.

Attesting to the quality of the education they are receiving, in 1997 a number of Minuteman Tech students earned state and national recognition:

- Courtney Eckhardt of Arlington received early admission to the Massachusetts Institute of Technology,
 and Gareth Driver of Arlington entered Harvard University.
- For the eighth time in 9 years, Minuteman Tech students won gold medals in the Commercial Baking competition at the Vocational Industrial Clubs of America (VICA) National Skill Olympics held in Kansas City in June. A Minuteman student also won a silver medal. In the national Robotic Workcell Technology competition. Other Minuteman students also did well in the national competition, placing 5th in the First Aid & CPR competition and 8th in Technical Computer Applications.
- In the Massachusetts state VICA competition, Minuteman Tech students won seven first place medals, six second place medals and four third place medals.
- Competing against 1.4 other high schools, Minuteman Tech's Math Team placed 3rd in the University of
 Massachusetts Lowell Challenge '97 competition, held at UMass Lowell in October. The four team
 members all received \$2000 per year scholarships to UMass Lowell for four years.
- Two Minuteman students were among the 32 first place winners in a field of 260 entered from across the state in the Massachusetts Science Fair at the Massachusetts Institute of Technology in May.

• In a field of 80 students representing 1 4 schools from New Hampshire, Rhode Island and Massachusetts, Minuteman Tech's Physics Team won first place in the "Great American Dream Machine" design and race at the New England Design Olympics held at Milton Academy in May.

For people who like to use the Internet, Minuteman Tech now has its own web site:

www.minuteman.org which is full of basic information about the school and its programs and up-to-date information about special programs and happenings at the school. The school calendar is also included.

During the past year, several members left the School Committee: long-time member Kenneth Whitcomb of Boxborough, Kenneth D. Mullen, Jr. of Needham, Anita M. Ware of Botton and Liz McNenny of Arlington. The district thanks these people for their service.

ANNUAL REPORT TO THE RESIDENTS OF LANCASTER

I am pleased to submit my first annual report as Superintendent of the Nashoba Regional School District. This year has been a building year. We have implemented policies and procedures that focus on student achievement, accountability, and fiscal responsibility. The financial difficulties associated with the 1.4 million dollar deficit uncovered with the closing of the books this fall are behind us and procedures have been instituted by the School Committee which will insure that this kind of difficulty does not plague the system in the future. During the current school year, in addition to addressing the financial issues, the District has begun an effort to make sure that instruction meets the needs of all children within the classroom. System-wide initiatives which require intensive staff development are underway to build the capacity of our schools to meet the needs of all students. An assessment system has been put in place which will be used on an annual basis to chart growth within the system. This assessment system uses both nationally normed tests and annual customer satisfaction surveys of students, parents, staff and graduates.

Measurable goals have been established for the system which will be reported to the public annually. All schools within the Nashoba Regional School District are focused on communication and collaboration, building trust with the community, and being accountable for student achievement and utilization of resources.

Several years ago, The Guidance Department made a conscious decision to help senior families find more scholarship money to help pay for higher education. We have all worked very hard to expand the numbers of local scholarships available to our students.

ANNUAL REPORT LANCASTER POLICE DEPARTMENT

During the past year the Police Department has under gone many changes. The largest change of all was in the area of administration, as we suffered the loss of our Police Chief Eric P. McAvene do to a medical disability retirement. Eric was a member of the Police department since 1971 and had been the Chief since 1984. He was a very dedicated Police officer, an asset to the Town of Lancaster and will be sorely missed by the police officers.

Another area where the Police Department has taken great strides is the area of computerization. At present time, besides, the equipment in the police station, three of our police units have been equipped with laptop computers that not only have the capability to have immediate communication with the dispatch center but is also connected directly to the Registry of Motor Vehicles system and the Criminal History Systems Board which allows the officers to obtain license and warrant checks directly from the units themselves. During 1998 the main computer system located at the Police station will be upgraded and with the upgrading the terminals in the cruisers will be integrated into the main terminal, which will allow the police officers to do their reports from the cruisers and transmit the information directly back to the station. This will save the officers a great deal of time, as there won't be a lot of down time at the station doing paperwork, which will allow the officers to have more proactive patrol time per shift.

During 1997, the vehicles used by the Police Department changed considerably. At present the vehicle force includes, two(2) marked patrol units, one(1) unmarked patrol unit and one(1) 4X4 marked Ford Expedition. The Expedition was purchased from prison mitigation funds and even though we had a very mild winter, with little snow fall, the vehicle was and will continue to be a major asset to our Department. The unmarked unit was put into service as the result of a donation received from Board of Selectman member Nathaniel Dexter. The Police Department was very fortunate to have received such a generous donation and we would like to express our deepest "thanks" to Mr. Dexter.

The unmarked patrol unit along with a radar sign board and funds received from a community policing block grant program are being used to confront a major community problem, that being the speed at which motorists are traveling while using the roadways of the Town of Lancaster. I receive complaints about this problem almost on a daily basis and I can assure everyone that the Police Department is attempting to do everything possible to combat this problem and make our streets safe for use by our school children, pedestrians, motor vehicle traffic and bicyclists. At present time the police department is severely under staffed and when the grant funds run dry, I cannot assure you that the traffic situation will get any better. I strongly urge all Town residents to attend the Annual Town Meeting and support the Police Department by adding the requested funds to our budget which would allow us to increase the

size of our existing Police force and give us the capability to do our jobs properly. Under the community policing theory the problems that affects the residents and life in the community are not just an issue where you call the police and they will handle it, but the police and the community are in partnership together and they handle problems as a team, now is the time that we need your support.

The Police Department actively pursues all available state and federal grant funds and is currently waiting to receive word from the Federal government about our application to the COPS MORE program which could provide funds to place two(2) Police Officers onto our force for three(3) years, thereafter the Town of Lancaster would have to take over the funding.

I would like to take this opportunity to thank all the Police Officers of the town of Lancaster for all the support that they have given to me during the course of the year and also would like to thank all of the other Town departments who have in one way or another assisted the Police Department throughout the year.

THE ONE FULL TIME AND ONE PART TIME EMPLOYEE OF THE CEMETERY DIVISION ALONG WITH THE COMMUNITY CREW FROM M.C.I. LANCASTER WAS KEPT VERY BUSY THIS YEAR WITH MOWING AND MAINTENCE OF THE TOWNS SIX CEMETERIES, TOWN PARKS, THAYER FIELD AND THE TOWN GREEN.

ALL OF THE RECORDS OF THE CEMETERIES THAT WERE available HAVE BEEN COMPUTERIZED IN THE D.P.W.'S COMPUTOR SYSTEM. THIS SHOULD INSURE MORE EFFICIENT KEEPING OF VITAL RECORDS.

WE ALSO PLANTED AN EVERGREEN TREE IN SOUTH PARK TO BE DECORATED AS A CHRISTMAS TREE WHICH WAS DONATED BY MRS. HELEN CURTIS OF MILL STREET.

THE TREE DIVISION REMOVED 57 DEAD DISEASED OR DANGEROUS TREES ALONG THE TOWNS ROADSIDES.

THE WATER DIVISION OF THE DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC WORKS HAD ANOTHER BUSY YEAR. DUE TO THE DRY SUMMER OF 1997, WE PUMPED 214,560,600 GALLONS OF WATER. WITHOUT OUR ADDITIONAL 2,000,000 STORAGE TANK, WE WOULD HAVE HAD TO GO TO A TOTAL BAN ON THE USE OF UNNECESSARY WATERING.

AS WELL AS OUR MONTHLY BACTERIA SAMPLING, WE DID ANOTHER ROUND OF TESTING AS PART OF THE LEAD/COPPER RULE. WE CONTINUE TO STAY WITHIN THE PARAMETERS SET BY D.E.P.. AS PART OF OUR BACK FLOW PROGRAM, ALL BUILDINGS HAVE BEEN SURVEYED, WITH ALL REQUIRED DEVICES INSTALLED. WE TESTED ALL DEVICES, WHICH NOW NUMBER 85, TWICE IN 1997.

THE OLD 6" PIPE WAS REPLACED WITH A 12" PIPE WHILE THE MILL STREET BRIDGE WAS BEING REBUILT. THIS WILL SAVE US MONEY LATER IF WE NEED TO EXTEND THE 12" MAIN. WITH THE SEWER PROJECT IN THE OLD COMMON ROAD AND HIGH STREET EXTENSION AREAS, WE WERE BUSY MARKING AND MAKING SURE THEY GOT AROUND OUR WATER LINES. WES CONSTRUCTION DID A GOOD JOB WORKING AROUND OUR 12" TRANSMISSION LINE.

WE HAVE SEEN QUITE A FEW PLANS FOR NEW SUBDIVISIONS, WHICH WILL ADD TO OUR WORK LOAD. ALL THE MEMBERS OF THE WATER DIVISION MUST ATTEND TRAINING COURSES AS PART OF THEIR DRINKING WATER LICENSE RENEWAL.

BY KEEPING UP WITH THE D.E.P. PROGRAMS, AND WITH NO VIOLATIONS, WE ARE ABLE TO DELIVER QUALITY WATER TO OUR CUSTOMERS.

WE DO HAVE TO LOOK AT OUR SPRING CLEANUP, SWEEP ROADS, CLEAN DRAINAGE, ETC.. OUR SWEEPER AND CATCH BASIN MACHINES ARE GETTING OLDER AND WE WOULD LIKE TO SEE A REPLACEMENT PROGRAM FOR THEM AS WE ALL KNOW REPAIRS COST MONEY AND TIME.

THE M.C.I. LANCASTER SEWERAGE PROJECT IS ONGOING AT THIS TIME/ HOPEFULLY, IT WILL BE DONE ON SCHEDULE GETTING THE ROADS BACK IN SHAPE.

THE MILL STREET BRIDGE JOB WAS GOING ALONG FAIRLY WELL UNTIL THE STATE STOPPED ALL STATE FUNDED JOBS FOR 6 WEEKS. AGAIN THIS JOB SHOULD BE DONE BY SUMMER? WITH THE BRIDGE BEING OPEN, THIS WILL SETTLE THE TRAFFIC DOWN A LITTLE IN OTHER AREAS OF TOWN.

JUST THIS WEEK WE HAD FLOODING AND ROAD CLOSURES, BOLTON ROAD AND CENTERBRIDGE ROAD. FIRST AND LATER DURING THE EVENING, ROUTE 117 WAS CLOSED. THE WATER RESCINDED BY WEDNESDAY MORNING AND THE ROADS WERE REOPENED WITH MINIMAL DAMAGE. WASHOUTS ON EDGE NEEDED GRAVEL BUT NOT MUCH MORE.

THE STATE IS LOOKING AT REPAVING THE ROUTE 117 BRIDGE BY LANGEN ROAD WITHIN THE NEXT COUPLE OF YEARS. THAT WILL MAKE FOR INTERESTING TRAFFIC PROBLEMS. THE STATE IS ALSO LOOKING AT RESURFACING LUNENBURG ROAD, HOPEFULLY SOON.

Dear Board Members:

I herewith submit the Annual Report as Veterans Agent for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1997.

The Veterans Department is under the direction of Chapter 115 of the General Laws of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts. We direct the Veterans Benefits Program, which is a joint program with the Commonwealth and the Town to deliver Veterans Benefits for qualified veterans and their dependents. Our office also aides, assists and advises Veterans and their dependents with questions and applications concerning Federal Benefits.

The Governor has signed into law Chapter 139 of the acts of 1997 which exempts military retirement income received on or after January 1, 1997 from paying State income tax. Also effective July 1, 1997 all Clause 22 Real Estate Tax abatements have been increased by \$75.00.

The annual payment for Gold Star Mothers has been increased from \$500.00 to \$1500.00 per year and this law takes effect on July 1: 1998.

January 1, 1998

Honorable Board of Selectmen:

New Legislation signed into law increases from \$500.00 to \$1500.00 the annual payment to now include all 100% Service Connected Disabled Veterans. Under the "Old Law", the veteran must have been missing an eye or limb from combat. This change is effective July 1, 1997.

Special License Plates for Silver Star and Bronze recipients become effective January 1, 1998. There is no fee for these new plates. Also, there will be no fee for Purple Heart Plates beginning January 1, 1998.

Our office is available to all veterans and their dependents on a full time basis at the Clinton Town Hall. Questions concerning Federal and State Benefits can be directed to this office at 365-4112.

In closing, I would like to thank the Board of Selectmen and all.
