Dear Members of the Board of Selectmen:

The following constitutes the Annual Report of the Lancaster Board of Appeals for the year 2001. The current membership of the Board is listed below.

During 2001, the Board received and processed seventeen zoning applications which required public hearings and decisions under Massachusetts General Laws Chapter 40A and the Lancaster Zoning By-law. The majority of the petitions related to proposed reconstruction or alteration of existing single and multi-family residential structures which were necessary because amendments to the Lancaster Zoning By-law increasing minimum lot area and required frontage have rendered the existing structures or lots nonconforming.

Two petitions sought zoning relief for the construction of personal wireless facilities (cell towers). The Board granted a special permit to Sprint Spectrum for the addition of antennae and related facilities to the existing monopole tower off Fort Pond Road. The Board denied the application of Sprint Spectrum for a use variance for the erection of a 150 foot monopole antenna on North Main Street outside of the Personal Wireless Facility Overlay District. An appeal from that decision, filed in Worcester Superior Court, Civil Action 01-1250A, was voluntarily dismissed by the agreement of the parties in February, 2002.

The Board wishes to express its appreciation for the capable assistance of Rene Read and Carla Walter of the Community Development and Planning Office, Town Clerk Roberta Winsor, and Building Commissioner Harold Avery for their efforts and assistance to the Board.

ANNUAL REPORT Lancaster Historical Commission 2001

In 2001 the Commission was chaired by Michael Sczerzen. Members of the Commission were Patricia Angevine, Elizabeth Colley, Kathleen Griffin, David Knott, Henry Paszko, Sally Rouleau, Michael Sczerzen, Jean Watson, and Associate Member William Kilbourn. During the year, Patricia Angevine resigned and William Kilbourn was appointed a full member. Richard Rose was appointed an Associate Member. Kathleen Griffin resigned during the later part of 2001 and the commission has a vacancy, presently, for a full member.

The office is open four hours a week providing service to the public regarding historical research and genealogical information. We returned to the General Fund money from the sale of books and research copy work.

The Town of Lancaster has been grappling with putting a Master Plan and Open Space Plan in place. The town voted to hire a full time planning director. The Commission prepared a proposed Demolition Delay Bylaw for consideration at the 2001 Annual Meeting. With the many changes in property sales in recent years, the Commission feels that an educational tool such as a Demolition Delay Bylaw will give owners and buyers opportunity to understand the significance of homes and buildings in town before they are demolished. Homes that were demolished were the Haskell House 429 Main Street which has been replaced with condos. The Walton Kilbourn house on Goss Lane burned in a fire and the house is a total loss.

The Commission has actively encouraged and recommended to the Building Committee of the Bulfinch Church (First Church of Christ Unitarian) that any proposed addition to their church be a separate building. The church and Board of Selectmen are negotiating a boundary line.

The town voted approval in May, 2000, of the appointment by the Selectmen of a De-accession Committee and has not yet scheduled any meetings. This committee will provide the town with knowledgeable historical recommendations of articles of significance to the town's history that are under consideration for de-accession.

The Historic District Study Committee appointment by the Selectmen is complete but for one member.

The town was awarded a grant of \$3,000 from Massachusetts Historical Records Advisory Board, Massachusetts Archives, Boston, for the Greater Lancaster Heritage Preservation Project. The town voted \$1,500.00 in matching funds at a special Town Meeting. Archivist, Melissa Mannon, was hired to do the survey. The Town Clerk office, Historical Commission, and Thayer Memorial Library's historic records were surveyed and inventoried. The final report is on file at the respective offices, and also the Board of Selectmen's office. Thanks to Joan Richards, Project Coordinator, for her efforts in completing this portion of the grant.

The Commission has set up an Adopt-A-Marker program with the goal of restoring and refurbishing some of our historic markers returning them to their sites in time for the 350th Celebration of the Town. Again, thanks goes to Henry Paszko who volunteered his time to supervise this program and his greenhouse as a workshop area where three seniors, Arnie Colombo, John McGraw and Harold Smith helped refurbish markers. Special thanks to Select Board Member Alexandra Turner for her guidance and assistance and the Department of Public Works for assistance in moving two heavy signs and replacing them. As soon as the markers are back in place, volunteers will be adopting a marker to maintain the area around the marker.

Three members from the Commission, Jean Watson, Liz Colley, and Kathleen Griffin volunteered to serve on the subcomittee for the 350th Celebration that Michael Sczerzen chairs.

The Rowlandson Garrison site land on Main Street changed hands and is now owned by Stephen Quill.

Townspeople are encouraged to remember that permission to enter the old burial yards is needed from the DPW or Communications Center.

ANNUAL REPORT

To the Honorable Board of Selectmen:

I hereby submit the annual report of the Department of Weights and Measures for the fiscal year 2001.

During the past year this department has ensured equity in the marketplace for both the consumer and merchant, while fulfilling the requirements mandated by the Massachusetts General Laws. This was accomplished by inspecting, testing accuracy and sealing all weighing and measuring devices used for commercial sales, throughout the Town of Lancaster.

Users of sealable weighing and measuring devices were charged \$480 in fees. Inquires, requests or complaints by consumers or merchants were responded to or investigated. A summary sheet of devices inspected is enclosed. Savings to consumers and merchants impacted by this department could not be determined due to the lack of gasoline totalizer data from previous inspections. Savings will be reported in the future.

The department test equipment was sent to the State Standards Laboratory to be certified as accurate. The gasoline test measure has been certified. The entire weight set has been condemned. A new 31 LB weight kit will need to be purchased as soon as possible in order for me to perform my duties as sealer for the community.

In the coming year I will continue to attend training sessions and further enhance certification as a sealer by adding additional disciplines. I plan to recommend to the Board, updating the weights and measures fee schedule. This is necessary in order to financially support the operating budget of this department in the future.

I wish to thank all of the town officials who have supported this department during the past year.

The Veterans Department is under the direction of Chapter 115 of the General Laws of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts. We direct the Veterans Benefits Program, which is a joint program with the Commonwealth and the Town to deliver the Veterans Benefits for qualified veterans and their dependents. Our office also, assists and advises veterans and their dependents with questions and applications concerning Federal Benefits.

Veterans received 2.6% cost of living adjustment in their Compensation and Pension checks beginning in December 2001.

The Veterans Medical Van visits the Town of Clinton the 2nd. Tuesday of each month from 10 A.M. until 3 P.M. at the American Legion 239 Chestnut Street. Bring a copy of your discharge or DD 214 to register for health care and prescription drug services. This service may also be done thru our office.

Vietnam Veterans with "Type 2" diabetes may be entitled to disability compensation under new regulations set by the Department of Veterans Affairs.

Our office is available to all veterans and their dependents on a full time basis at the Clinton Town Hall. Questions concerning Federal and State Benefits can be directed to this office at 1 978-365-4112.

ANNUAL REPORT TO THE TOWN OF LANCASTER

The 2001-2002 school year has been a time of change for the Nashoba Regional School District beginning with the restructuring of the School Committee. As of May 2001, the school committee was reduced in size from 13 to 8 members: two from Bolton, three from Lancaster, and three from Stow. Carlos LLanso, Deborah Traylor, and Linda Weatherbee all returned to represent Lancaster. Former committee members Joseph Farragher, Douglas McLean, and Mary Beth Yantz as well as members currently serving are to be commended for their tireless and sometimes thankless service to education.

Nashoba High School has had a physical transition—the work is nearly completed on the \$24,352,821 renovation. A spectacular new auditorium with a full stage and performance electronics will allow both the school and community to properly showcase our performing arts programs. An expanded gymnasium, reconfigured cafeteria, and additional classroom space as well as renovation of existing space and systems have brought new life to the school.

In Lancaster, a new elementary school has been completed. It is temporarily housing middle school students while renovations are undertaken to that building and will open as a Prekindergarten to Grade 5 school in the fall. The 250-seat auditorium in the new building is the first public assembly area in the town. For the first time in more years than can be remembered, the Lancaster Town Meeting will be held on town property!

Change has affected the school district administration, too. Lois Ducharme was hired in August as our Director of Special Education. During her short tenure with us, Ms. Ducharme has begun to refine programs and procedures and to restructure her department. These modifications have resulted in financial savings during the current fiscal year and in anticipated reductions in the special education budget for next year.

Overall, the district is pleased with the MCAS test results for 2001. The Grade 3 reading test showed that 81% of our students are proficient readers, compared to the state average of 61%. The Grades 4 and 8 results stayed basically the same, with a slight increase in English/Language Arts and a minimal decrease in Grade 4 math scores.

The Grade 10 results showed significant improvement in English Language Arts and mathematics. Failures in mathematics were reduced from 31% to 8% and from 19% to 6% in English Language Arts. The High School was ranked number 35 out of 303 in Massachusetts.

Support programs such as the "Summer of Success" for high school students and MCAS preparation tutoring sessions are showing positive results. Teachers are implementing MCAS actions plans devised last year and will further analyze current data to adjust and fine-tune those plans. Other related initiatives include the alignment of curriculum outcomes K-12, increasing time on task for some content areas, offering staff development workshops on differentiating instruction, and piloting and selecting new standards-based materials.

I wish to thank the citizens of Bolton for their continued support for children and education in the Nashoba Regional District.

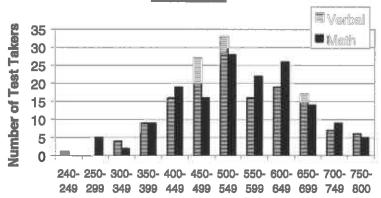

1.1. Intent and Purposes

The purpose of this bylaw is to establish a procedure for reviewing requests to demolish significant buildings in order to preserve, when possible, the historical, cultural and architectural heritage of Lancaster.

1.2 Definitions

- 1.2.1 Building a structure capable of being used to shelter persons, animals, materials, or equipment.
- 1.2.2 Commission -the Lancaster Historical Commission
- 1.2.3 Demolition -any voluntary act of pulling down, destroying, burning, removing, or razing of a building in whole or in part; commencing the work of destruction; or allowing the same to be done by others.
- 1.2.4 Applicant- a person or persons filing an application for review under this bylaw.

 If the person submitting the application is not the owner, the owner will be required to indicate his/her assent to the filing of the notice or application.
- 1.2.5 Significant building -any building which is historical by reason of its age (in whole or in part seventy-five (75) or more years and is determined by the Commission to be either (1) associated with a person or event contributing to the cultural, political, economic, social or architectural history of the town, commonwealth, or the United States of America; or (2) historically or architecturally important (in terms of period, style, construction, or association with an architect or builder), either by itself or in the context of a group of buildings.
- 1.2.6 Preferably preserved significant building -any significant building for which it is determined after hearing to be in the public's interest to preserve or rehabilitate rather demolishing under this bylaw.
- 1.2.7 Demolition permit -any permit (demolition, alteration, building) issued by the Building Inspector, as required by the State Building Code, which authorizes the demolition of a building (excluding interior demolition).
- 1.2.8 Day any calendar day, including Saturday, Sundays and holidays.

1.3 Procedure

- 1.3.1 No demolition permit shall be issued for a significant building without first fully complying with the provisions of this bylaw.
- 1.3.2 The Building Inspector shall forward a copy of each demolition permit application for a building to the Commission upon receipt.

ATTACHER | V

- If the demolition permit application is for a building which is seventy-five (75) or more years old, the building's historical significant will be determined by the Commission within (14) days of the Commission's receipt of the application. The Commission will notify the Building Inspector and applicant writing of this initial determination. If the building is not determined to be significant, the Building Inspector may issue a permit to demolish in accordance with all applicable procedures.
- 13.4 If the building is determined to be significant, the Commission shall hold a public hearing within thirty (30) days of this initial determination to further determine whether the demolition of the building will be detrimental to the historical, cultural or architectural heritage of the town. Notice of the time, place and purpose of the hearing shall be given twice in a local newspaper, the first notice at least fourteen (14) days before and the second notice at least seven (7) days before such hearing and by posting a notice in the Town Hall for a period of at least (14) days before such hearing and by mailing a notice of hearing to the applicant.
- 13.5 The Commission within seven (7) days of the close of the public hearing shall make a determination. The applicant, Building Inspector and the Town Clerk shall be provided with a copy of the determination.
- 1.3.6 If the Commission determines the demolition of the building in question is not detrimental to the historical, cultural or architectural heritage of the town, the applicant may apply for the necessary permits to begin work.
- 1.3.7 If the Commission determines the demolition of the building in question is detrimental to the historical, cultural or architectural heritage of the town, the building shall be deemed a preferable preserved significant building and no further demolition permits may be applied for or issued for a period of six (6) months from the date of such determination.
- 1.3.8 During the six (6) month period, the Commission will invite the applicant (and owner of record, if different from applicant) to participate in an investigation of alternatives to demolition. If the Commission and the applicant agree upon acceptable alternatives, the Commission will file a copy of said agreement with the Building Inspector and Town Clerk and the applicant may apply for necessary permits to begin work. Work shall only be done in accordance with the terms of the agreement unless and until new permit applications are filed and processed hereunder.
- 1.3.9 If the Commission is satisfied that there is no feasible alternative to demolition, the Commission may so advise the applicant, Building Inspector and Town Clerk in writing, at any time during this six (6) month period, and the Building Inspector may issue a permit to demolish in accordance with the applicable procedure.

1.4 Emergency Demolitions

1.4.1 Nothing in this bylaw restricts the demolition of a significant building determined by the Building Inspector to present a danger to public safety which only demolition can prevent. Such a determination shall be made in accordance with the applicable provisions of the State Building Code and after consultation with the Commission Chairperson or designee. Whenever an emergency demolition permit is

issued under the provisions of this section, a written report must be filed with the Commission describing the condition of the building and basis for the determination.

1.5 Enforcement and Remedies

- 1.5.1 The Commission and the Building Inspector are each authorized to enforce the provisions of this bylaw.
- 1.5.1 The Building Inspector shall not issue a permit pertaining to any property on which a significant building has been demolished voluntarily in whole or in part without first fully complying with the provisions of this bylaw for a period of two (2) years from the date of demolition.
- 1.5.2 The provisions of this bylaw may be enforced by a non-criminal disposition pursuant to Section 1.1.5 of the Administrative Bylaws of the Town of Lancaster.

1.6 Administration

- 1.6.1 The Commission may adopt such rules and regulations as are necessary to administer the terms of this bylaw.
- 1.6.2 The Commission is authorized to adopt a schedule of fees to cover the costs associated with the administration and review of any application, which is filed under this bylaw.

1.7 Severability

1.7.2 If any provision of this bylaw is determined to be invalid or unconditional by any court, every other section shall continue in full force and effect.

"Notes: No building housing poultry to be within 150 feet of a property line; no outdoor storage of odor-producing substances or fenced poultry to be less than 100 ft. from an off-premises dwelling, and no livestock shall be permitted within 50 feet of an off-premises dwelling." or act in any manner relating thereto.

It was voted 190 in favor, 6 opposed, to authorize the Board of Selectmen to enter into leases with a provider or providers of telecommunication services for the installation and maintenance of cellular/wireless communication antennae and related facilities on the following parcels within the Town of Lancaster which are within the care, custody and control of the Board of Selectmen: Assessor's Map 28, Parcel 1, Brockelman Road; Assessor's Map 37, Parcel 31 Winsor Lane; Assessor's Map 43, Parcel 1, Mill Street Extension; provided that such leasing is conducted in compliance with G.L. c.30B; and to further authorize the Board of Selectmen to grant such easements as may be deemed necessary for the provision of access and utility service to such facilities; said leases(s) or license agreement(s) to be for a term of more than three years and on such additional terms and conditions as the Board of Selectmen shall deem to be in the best interests of the Town; further, to authorize the Board of Selectmen to petition the Massachusetts legislature for approval of such leases and easements under Article 97 of the Amendments to the Massachusetts Constitution; and further, to petition the General Court to the end that legislation be adopted precisely as follows: The General Court may make editorial or clerical changes of form only to the bill, unless the Selectmen approve amendments to the bill before enactment by the General Court. The Selectmen are hereby authorized to approve amendments that shall be within the scope of the general public objectives of this petition.

AN ACT AUTHORIZING THE BOARD OF SELECTMEN IN THE TOWN OF LANCASTER TO LEASE CERTAIN LANDS TO WIRELESS COMMUNICATIONS COMPANIES FOR THE ERECTION OF WIRELESS ANTENNAS OR OTHER RELATED APPURTENANT STRUCTURES.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:

SECTION 1. Notwithstanding the provisions of any general or special law to the contrary, including without limitation section 3 of chapter 40 of the General Laws, the board of selectmen of the town of Lancaster, on behalf of the town, may lease for a period not to exceed 20 years, the hereinafter described parcels of land or portions of buildings, including any appurtenant air rights, to wireless communications companies for the erection or wireless antennas or related structures, after compliance with chapter 30B of the General Laws, including that described portion of the Town Forest, presently dedicated to forestry use, and a portion of the water holding tank and well fields, presently dedicated to water utilization,

- (1) Lancaster Town Forest, Brockelman Road, said area(s) to be identified and approved by the Board of Selectmen.
- (2) Water Storage Tanks, Winsor Lane, said area(s) to be identified and approved by the Board of Selectmen
- (3) Water Well Fields, Mill Street Extension, said area(s) to be identified and approved by the Board of Selectmen.

SECTION 2. Notwithstanding the provisions of any general or special law to the contrary, including without limitation, the provisions of section 3 of chapter 40 of the General Laws, all proceeds for lease or leases of property leased by the town of Lancaster to telecommunication companies for the erection of wireless antennas or related structures shall be deposited into the available funds of the town and be available for any purpose as voted by the town.

SECTION 3. This act shall take effect upon its passage.

ARTICLE 20

It was voted to transfer care, custody and control of a portion of the land owned by the Town described below to the Board of Selectmen for the purpose of conveying an easement to Massachusetts Electric Company and further, to authorize the Board of Selectmen to grant an easement to Massachusetts Electric Company located in, through, under, over, across, and upon a parcel of land located off the westerly sides of Route 117 and Main Street, being specifically 37.8 acres as shown on a Plan of Land recorded with the Worcester District Registry of Deeds in Plan Book 352, Plan 92. And further, is laid out and more particularly shown on a MECO sketch entitled: "Massachusetts Electric, A NEES company; Lancaster Middle School, Main Street @ Rte 117, Lancaster, MA; Riser, Lateral, and Padmount Transformer Locations; Scale: 1" = 40'; Date: 3/16/00; WH 4870-0," said sketch on file for public inspection in the Town Clerk's Office, for the purpose of installing, operating and maintaining underground electric cables and associated equipment, including the facilities required to interconnect cables to electric lines, upon such terms and conditions as the Board of Selectmen shall determine to be appropriate.

(a) "Shall the board of selectmen be authorized to grant licenses for the sale of beer and wine to be drunk on the premises in restaurants having at least 50 but not more than 125 seats; provided, that not more than 2 such licenses shall be in effect.

(b) "Shall the board of selectmen be authorized to grant licenses for the sale of all alcoholic beverages to be drunk on the premises in restaurants having at least 100,but not more than 500 seats, provided, that not more than 4 restaurant alcohol licenses of any type shall be in effect.

- 7. This bylaw shall be enforceable by the building inspector, the building inspector's designee(s), and the police department of the Town of Lancaster.

To see if the Town will vote to adopt the following general bylaw, or act in any manner relating thereto:

Construction Working Hours

1. All work including, but no limited to, construction, remodeling, yard work with machinery, street work and utility work shall be subject to the following hours:

Monday - Friday:

7:00 a.m. - Dusk

Saturday:

8:00 a.m. - Dusk

Sunday:

9:00 a.m. - Dusk

- 2. All emergency work for streets, utilities and snow removal shall be exempt from this provision.
- 3. The fine for any violation of this bylaw will be \$50.00 per violation. Each day that a violation exists shall constitute a separate and continuing violation subject to the penalty as provided herein.
- 4. This bylaw shall be enforceable by the building inspector, the building inspector's designee(s), and the police department of the Town of Lancaster

To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to grant a release deed for nominal consideration to the A.C.M.C. Limited Partnership – No. 1 for that portion of the Duval Road being shown on a plan prepared by Whitman & Bingham Associates, Inc. dated August 30, 1999 and recorded with Worcester District Registry of Deeds in Plan Book 746, Plan 34 and filed with the Town Clerk described and bounded as follows: Northerly by land of A.C.M.C. Abbreviated Minutes Special Town Meeting October 29, 2001

The Special Town Meeting was called to order at 7 p.m. by Moderator James Burgoyne. There were a total of 111 voters present.

ARTICLE 1 - It was voted to amend the vote taken under Article 11 of the May 7, 2001 Annual Town Meeting as follows: To take \$12,000 from available free cash to be expended by the 350th Anniversary Committee for 350th Anniversary Celebration related expenses; further, that \$4,700 be taken from available free cash to be expended by the Lancaster Cultural Council for 350th Anniversary Celebration activities as allowed under the Local Cultural Council Matching Incentive Program Grant guidelines and in agreement with the 350th Anniversary Committee.

ARTICLE 2 - It was voted to take \$21.40 from the Stabilization Fund to be expended by the Police Department to pay an FY2001 outstanding bill to Clinton Hospital for services rendered.

UNANIMOUS

ARTICLE 3 - It was voted to take \$86.04 from the Stabilization Fund to be expended by the Fire Department to pay an FY2001 outstanding bill to Schofield Power Equipment for services rendered.

UNANIMOUS

ARTICLE 4 - It was voted to take \$78.83 from the Stabilization Fund to be expended by the Community Development & Planning Department to pay an FY2001 outstanding bill to VoiceCom for services rendered.

UNANIMOUS

ARTICLE 5 - It was voted to take \$3,000 from the Stabilization Fund to compensate the Electrical Inspector for FY2001 unpaid wages and take \$500 from the Stabilization Fund to compensate the Assistant Electrical Inspector for FY2001 unpaid wages.

ARTICLE 6 - It was voted to amend the Personnel Compensation Wage and Salary Scale by increasing all amounts by 3 1/2% effective July 1, 2001.

ARTICLE 7 - It was voted to raise and appropriate \$40,000 and take \$87,622 from the Stabilization Fund to supplement the FY2002 non-unit wage increases.

ARTICLE 8 - It was voted to amend the FY2002 Water Enterprise Fund Budget, as adopted under Article 7 of the May 7, 2001 Annual Town Meeting for the purpose of funding FY2002 wage increases, by amending salaries and wages as follows:

Salaries & Wages, Permanent Positions from \$102,987 to \$95,951 Salaries & Wages, Permanent Administration from \$42,548 to \$49,970 Additional Gross, Overtime from \$10,500 to \$10, 956

And further, by amending Investment Income from \$10,000 to \$10,842

UNANIMOUS

ARTICLE 9 - It was voted to take \$35,453 from the Stabilization Fund to supplement FY2002 Expense Budget line items as follows:

Thayer Memorial Library, \$2,453 Group Life & Health Insurance Premiums, \$20,000 Public Official Liability Insurance, \$13,000

ARTICLE 10 - It was voted to take \$3,000 from the Stabilization Fund to be expended by the Town Accountant to purchase computer system hardware.

UNANIMOUS

ARTICLE 11 - It was voted to take \$29,875 from the Stabilization Fund to be expended by the Police Department to purchase a new police cruiser.

ARTICLE 12 - It was voted to take \$16,000 from the Stabilization Fund to be expended by the Fire Department to purchase new radio equipment.

ARTICLE 15 - It was voted to take \$10,000 from the Stabilization Fund to be expended by the Board of Public Works to make repairs to department buildings.

UNANIMOUS

ARTICLE 16 - It was voted to take \$8,500 from the Stabilization Fund to be expended by the Board of Public Works to conduct environmental compliance audits of department facilities.

ARTICLE 17 - It was voted to take \$5,000 from the Stabilization Fund to be expended by the Board of Public Works to contract with private tree services for the removal of dead and hazardous trees along public ways and for associated expenses.

UNANIMOUS

ARTICLE 18 - This article asking voters to rescind the votes taken under Article 23 of the May 19, 1997 Annual Town Meeting and Article 16 of the May 7, 2001 Annual Town Meeting relating to Numbering of Buildings was tabled.

ARTICLE 19 - This article asking voters to adopt a general bylaw relating to Construction Working Hours was defeated.

ARTICLE 20 - It was voted to authorize the Board of Selectmen to grant a release deed for nominal consideration to the A.C.M.C. Limited Partnership-No.1 for that portion of the Duval Road being shown on a plan prepared by Whitman & Bingham Associates, Inc. dated August 30, 1999 and recorded with Worcester District Registry of Deeds in Plan Book 746, Plan 34 and filed with the Town Clerk described and bounded as follows: Northerly by land of A.C.M.C. Limited Partnership No. 1 464.70 feet more or less; thence Easterly by land of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts 60 feet, more or less; thence Southerly by land of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts 460.25 feet, more or less; thence Westerly by the terminus of the previously discontinued portion of Duval Road 60 feet more or less to the point of beginning; and, further authorize the Board of Selectmen to acquire by gift and to accept a turnaround easement for vehicular traffic over land owned by A.C.M.C. Limited Partnership No. 1 and shown on the above referenced plan upon such terms and conditions as the Board shall determine appropriate, for the purpose of a public way.

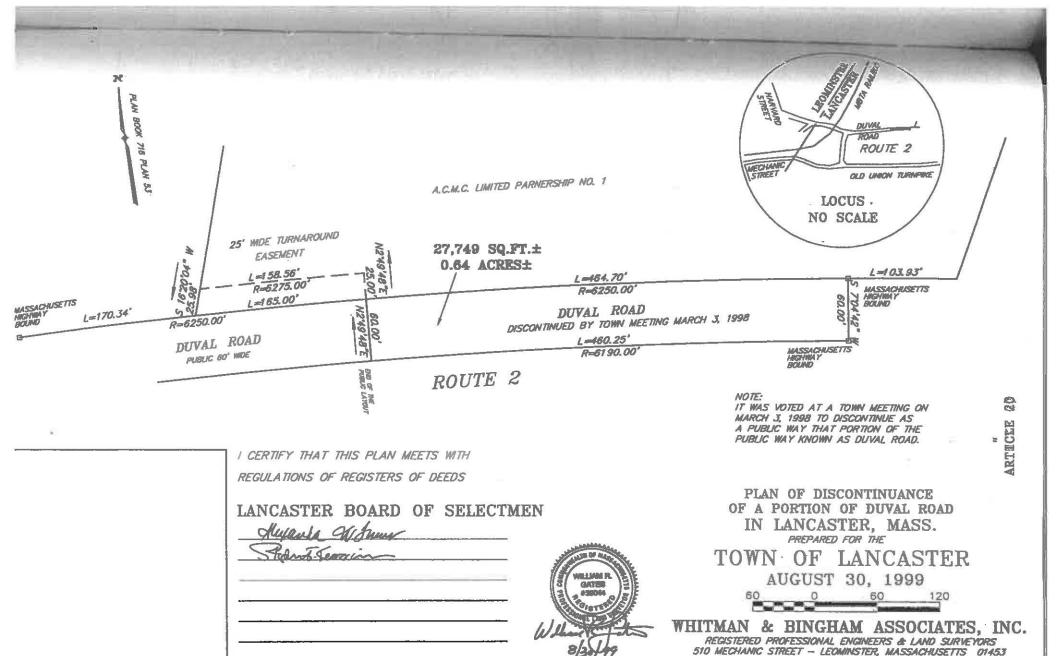

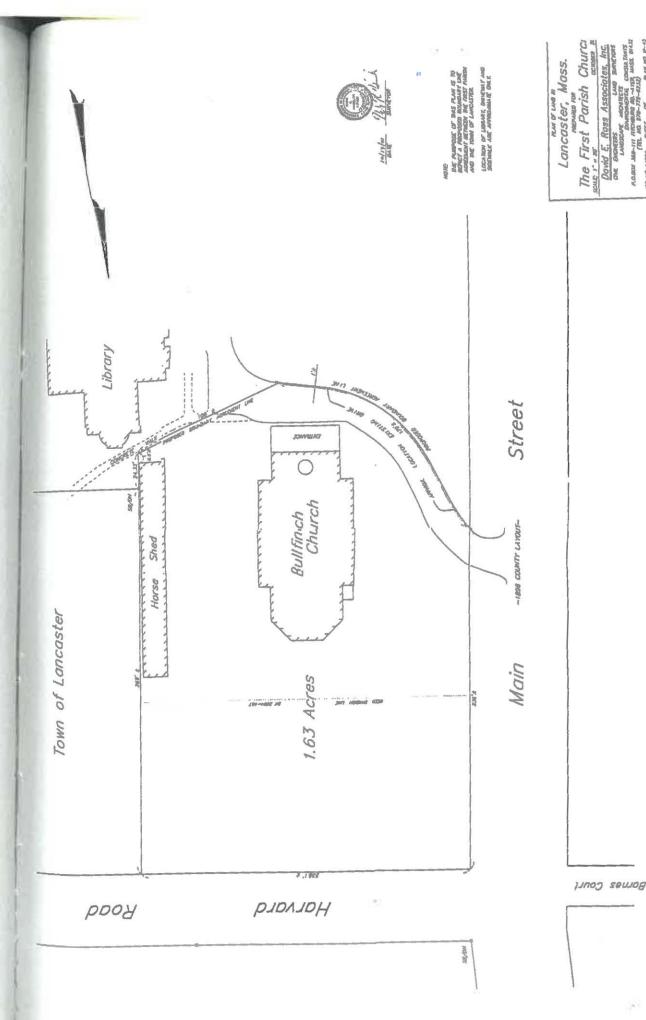
